# Let's Go Be Brave

In moments of uncertainty, 7-year-old Addi grasps mom Leanne's hand, looks at her, and says, "Let's go be brave." It's been Addi's guiding force for five years as she battled Stage 4 Neuroblastoma, liver failure and multiple ongoing complications from treatment.



That bravery even shows up when dealing with her peers. Addi requires hearing aids as a result of her cancer treatment. When kids point or ask, Addi says proudly, "Yeah, my cancer did that." The hearing aids are a badge of honor—a sign that she is winning the fight. **In 2023, she earned another badge—five years cancer-free!**

Addi's strength has rubbed off on her family, too. It gave her parents the perseverance to find the next doctor, the next hospital, and the next medical trial when others said treatment was hopeless.

Treatment near Addi's house was impossible—**her hometown in North Georgia doesn't have a pediatrician, let alone pediatric cancer specialists.** Leanne thinks they would have been sleeping in their car to get to doctors' appointments on time had it not been for the Atlanta Ronald McDonald House.

The Mastens stay at the Ronald McDonald House for periodic tests and check-ins, but the outlook is much different. This brave girl has goals, after all.

## ANGELIQUE'S STORY

# Finding the Ordinary

The close-knit Walker family is perfectly normal, and that's just the way they like it. Twelve years ago, when Angelique was 2-weeks-old, parents Alisha and Benjamin received a call that changed their life—Angelique had sickle cell disease.



**Angelique was hospitalized 12 times and underwent three surgeries.** After that third surgery, the Walkers learned about a bone marrow transplant as a possible cure. Angelique's four sisters were tested. Two were perfect matches in an outcome that the Walkers can only call miraculous.

At 4-years old, Angelique entered the hospital to undergo testing, preparations, and intensive chemotherapy. Finally, she was ready for her transplant, courtesy of her 9-year-old sister Alana.

When Angelique left the hospital, **she was severely immunocompromised and required a space that would allow her to heal with minimal risk of infection.** Enter the Atlanta Ronald McDonald House and the Walkers' first steps toward normalcy.

With family by her side, Angelique thrived. On March 5, 2015, Angelique left the House and started Kindergarten. Since then, Angelique has experienced thousands of normal moments, from swimming to going to church to learning to crochet.

## EASTON'S STORY

# What a Difference a Year Makes

In October 2022, 7-year-old Easton took little sister Emilynn for a ride in his kid-sized utility terrain vehicle (UTV). Easton lost control of the UTV and hit the Fielders' brick mailbox. Emilynn was unharmed, but **Easton's seatbelt failed, and his head hit the steering wheel.**



Easton was airlifted to Children's Healthcare of Atlanta. In his first days there, Easton almost died several times. The prognosis was dire.

However, one neurologist had a different opinion. She told the Fielders, **"Give it a year. He just needs time."**

Easton made significant strides during his two months in the hospital. Finally, he was ready to begin intensive rehabilitation therapies, so the family checked into the Ronald McDonald House, or "the Ronald," as mom Nichole calls it.

That first night, Nichole was terrified to be away from Easton's care team. She needn't have been. The Atlanta Ronald McDonald House was exactly where Easton belonged.

"Kids are resilient, but having something to look forward to at the House really pushed him to get better because he wanted to stand up and play by himself," Nichole says.

Six months later, **Easton returned home much improved but still with more to achieve—he was learning to do almost everything again**, from talking and walking, to swimming, and playing baseball.

“Even when Easton was in a wheelchair and not talking, there were so many fun things for him to do at the House. He loves the pinball machine, and as he progressed, we went from having to stand there to hold him up to — he would just walk over there and play.”

## DREW'S STORY

# It's For The Kids

**Drew Muller's grandfather opened his first McDonald's restaurant in 1974**, just a few years before the first Atlanta Ronald McDonald House opened its doors.



As a child, Drew remembers bringing pop tabs to his grandfather's restaurants to raise money for Atlanta RMHC. Now, as an owner, Drew has made it a driving force at his restaurants.

That's why Drew was the perfect person to solicit other Atlanta Owner/Operators to support the new House on Children's Healthcare of Atlanta's North Druid Hills campus, near the Arthur M. Blank Hospital.

**With his encouragement, the Atlanta Owner/ Operators pledged \$10 million.**

With broader buy-in secured, Drew works to ensure his restaurants raise their fair share. He focuses on community—his crew members and the customers who patronize his locations.

Once a year, general managers from all 27 locations meet at one of the Houses. This meeting helps educate new managers on the impact of the Houses and importance of the Round-Up for RMHC program, in which customers round up their total to the nearest dollar to help support the Houses.

He says, "In every one of our restaurants, Monday through Sunday from open to close, we ask every customer to Round-Up." **With that one question, Drew's restaurants raised \$245,844 in 2023.**

Drew acknowledges that asking can feel like a tall order for new crew members, so he makes sure to express how Atlanta RMHC saves and changes lives. In his experience, "Once they understand what the Houses provide, they're all in."

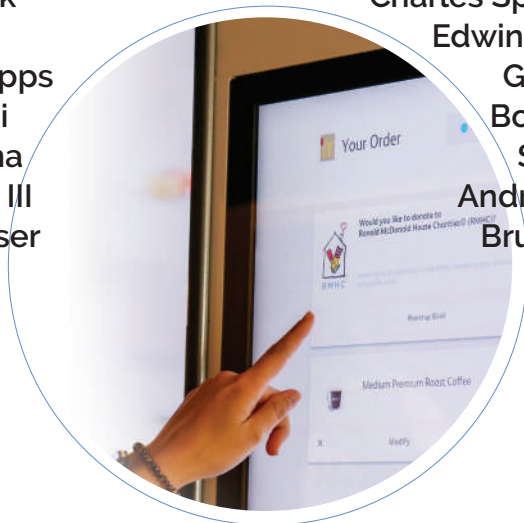

# It's More Than Food

Comfort through food is the focus of Atlanta RMHC's chef-lead meal program. **Each meal helps ease the families' financial and mental load** and involve the community in its mission.



In years past, one of the most popular ways to get involved was through volunteer-led dinners, in which volunteers plan the meals, purchase all supplies, cook, and serve. In 2022, Atlanta RMHC introduced something new: Meals That Heal.

For just a \$400 commitment, Chef Jeff Freehof, Atlanta RMHC's culinary manager, handles the planning, shopping and leads volunteers through preparing the meal.

Chef Jeff has been in the food service industry for more than 40 years. "This is the highest purpose of anything I've done in food service...I'm just so proud of what we do," Jeff says.

**Meals That Heal groups cook for 60 to 80 people**, though only 25 to 30 often show up at mealtime. Chef Jeff doesn't worry they've cooked too much because he knows other families are caring for their children at the hospital. He leaves the leftovers in the fridge. The next morning, they're gone.

After seeing great success at the Gatewood House, **ARMHC is expanding the program to the Peachtree Dunwoody House**. For Jeff, food is love, and he plans to give that love, positivity, and delicious food to as many families as possible.

# A New World of Care

On December 6, 2023, Atlanta Ronald McDonald House Charities and community members broke ground on a new Ronald McDonald House to serve the vital needs of families traveling to Atlanta for pediatric care.



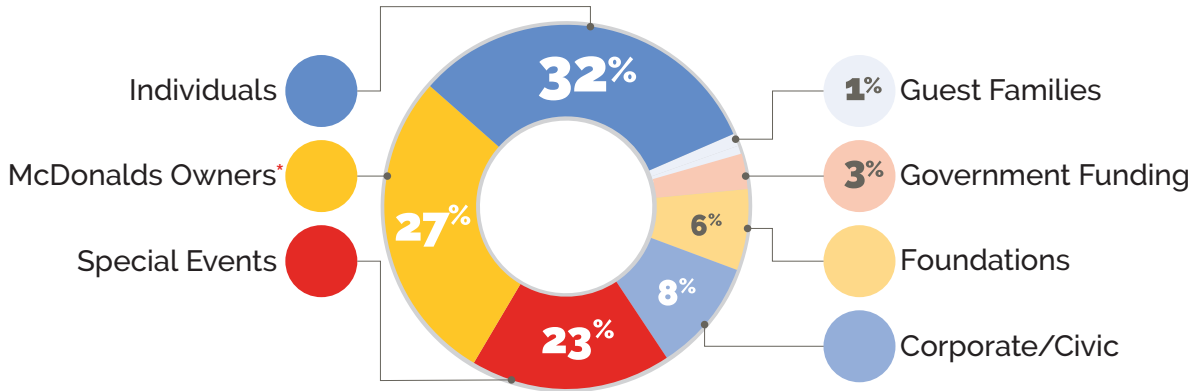
The new House will be on the Children's Healthcare of Atlanta North Druid Hills campus, near the Arthur M. Blank Hospital at North Druid Hills Road and Interstate 85. It will open in late 2025. It will include **approximately 126,000 square-feet, featuring 92 guest rooms and 18 transplant suites.** Naming opportunities are available.

Families and children will find respite in **20 acres of green space, miles of trails, an abundance of trees, and views of Atlanta's skyline and Stone Mountain** just outside their front door. Intentional spaces, such as light-filled rooms, an indoor playscape, and an expansive outdoor Discovery Garden, will help create special memories.
