What happened to our daughter Tori could have happened to anyone.

Both Tori and her younger sister were on their way to becoming acclaimed dancers. They were healthy, normal teenagers. Then one night our younger daughter, Tristin, rushed to wake us up.

"Tori can't use her hand!"

When we got to Tori, she couldn't speak, or move her right hand. We rushed her to the hospital. They quickly took her into surgery and removed the back of her skull. She had a brain bleed — a bad one. Unfortunately, she had been born with an arteriovenous malformation (AVM), and we had no idea.

Tori initially stabilized but after several complications she was transferred to Atlanta — three and a half hours away from our home and our network of support in Columbia, South Carolina.

A social worker told us about the Atlanta Ronald McDonald House, but we didn't really know what it was. I knew it was a place where people could stay. When I got there and watched the orientation video, I just sat down and cried."

INSIDE A NEW WORLD OF CARE



Atlanta RMHC will open the doors to a new 5-story House shortly after the Children's Arthur M. Blank Hospital opens, ready to welcome families into 92 spacious guest rooms and 18 transplant suites. The new House will more than double the capacity of the House near Egleston to meet an exponential demand for world-class pediatric care and the specialized support Atlanta RMHC provides.


Located on approximately four acres overlooking the medical campus, families will live in immediate proximity to their children undergoing medical treatment. Families and children will find respite in 20 acres of green space, miles of trails, an abundance of hardwood trees, and views of Atlanta's skyline and Stone Mountain.

The new House will continue our pioneering work to offer dedicated transplant suites and feature custom dining areas to meet families' specialized needs. All areas including interior and exterior play spaces will be fully ADA-accessible. Families will also enjoy a whimsical Discovery Garden that combines the beauty of nature and the awe of creativity with playful architectural elements, covered seating, and greenspace to facilitate healing through play.

Intentional spaces throughout the House such as light-filled rooms, dedicated areas for wellness and arts and crafts, an expansive front porch, an immersive 5-story playscape, and a playful home for our therapy dogs will help foster connecting and making memories.

The House near Egleston will remain in operation until the new House opens in late 2025, after which all programming and services will transition from Egleston to the North Druid Hills campus. The House near Scottish Rite will continue serving families in need with no change to its operations.

My son Jupiter was born with hypoplastic left heart syndrome. I held him for two minutes after he was born, then they rushed him away to save his life.

As soon as I left the hospital after giving birth, I went right to the Atlanta Ronald McDonald House where I stayed for 215 days.

Every day, I walked from the House to the hospital, developing a morning and evening routine with Jupiter. While at the House, I got out of the hospital and cleared my head.

When Jupiter was born, I was living two and a half hours away from the hospital, so I don't know what I would have done without the House. I would have probably slept in my car.

In the first five months of his life, Jupiter had two heart attacks and two open-heart surgeries. In between heart surgeries, Jupiter and I could be at the House together.

Now, Jupiter is thriving! He still has one more heart surgery ahead of him. As soon as I'm able, I want to pay it forward because the House was truly a home away from home for us."



For more than four decades, Atlanta Ronald McDonald House Charities has worked alongside Children's Healthcare of Atlanta and other specialty care providers to keep families with ill and injured children together and near the care and resources they need to thrive. Childhood illnesses are complex and as the need for world-class pediatric care grows, Atlanta RMHC has expanded capacity and evolved programming to meet the increasing demand for its services. To date, Atlanta RMHC has welcomed nearly 80,000 families in need from all 159 counties in Georgia and beyond.

Atlanta RMHC provides more than 25,000 overnight stays each year, helping families save more than \$8.4 million on lodging, transportation, and meal expenses.

Atlanta RMHC currently operates two House programs with a total of 81 guest rooms and is proud to be Children's Healthcare of Atlanta's only housing partner.

Now, as Children's opens its new North Druid Hills campus to increase access to high-quality pediatric care for Georgia's kids, Atlanta RMHC is growing alongside it with a new next-generation Ronald McDonald House — the first in Georgia to be sited directly on a medical campus.

This location will help ensure that children and their families traveling from across Georgia and beyond have access to the critical care and specialized services they need.






A NEW WORLD OF CARE FOR THE NEXT GENERATION



A young man with an old soul, Rohan Malempati had an enthusiastic smile and a generous spirit. Although he was diagnosed with Omenn syndrome as a baby, the struggle didn't harden him; it instilled in him a deep sense of compassion.
